The region TRU serves also extends into the territories of the St'át'imc, Nlaka'pamux, Nuxalk, Tšilhqot'in, Dakelh and Syilx peoples.

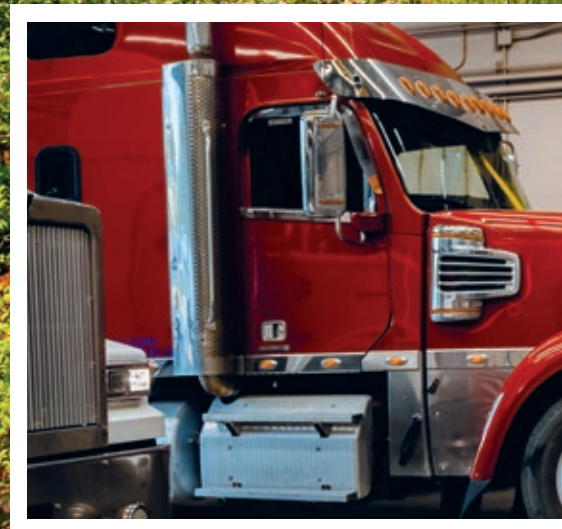

Indigenous students at TRU

TRU Williams Lake is situated on the traditional and unceded lands of T'exelc within the traditional territory of the Northern Secwépemc people. We honour this connection through an array of programs and services to welcome and support Indigenous students.

We provide small class sizes, personal attention and practical learning experiences in every program. While many students come from the

region and are Secwépemc, Carrier, T̓silhqot'in, Stát'imc, Okanagan, Nuxalk, Nlaka'pamux, Métis and Inuit, we welcome Indigenous students from across the country.

Walking alongside you is the Indigenous Student Services Coordinator and Gathering Place community, supporting your transition to university life with mentoring, life-skills coaching, tutoring and other services.

ELDERS IN THE GATHERING PLACE

Dr. Cecilia DeRose, Esk'etemc

Elder Cecilia is a champion of language revitalization and an Indigenous knowledge keeper. As a Secwepemctsin teacher, advisor and contributor to language programs, she has had a massive impact on the healing of Secwépemc communities. She is an expert in medicinal plants and is known for her handiwork with hides, birch bark baskets and beads. DeRose received the Indspire Award for Culture, Heritage and Spirituality in 2018 and a Doctor of Letters from TRU in 2024.

Irvine Johnson, Esk'etemc

Born in Esket, Irvine attributes his fluency in Secwepemctsin to his grandparents, who raised him. As a residential school survivor and Prince George College graduate, he became Chief of Alkali Lake in 1971 and has been active in First Nations politics. He serves as a Treaty Negotiator for the Esk'etemc and shares his wisdom of Secwépemc history and culture as a storyteller and knowledge keeper. He is a Hereditary Chief, an Elder and serves on the Williams Lake Indigenous Court.

Ann Louie, Williams Lake First Nation

WLFN Councillor Ann Louie was born in Williams Lake and raised by her grandparents, Caroline and Alec Gilbert. She is a direct descendant of Chief William through her grandmother, who is daughter of Chief Tillion William. She prioritizes keeping community members engaged and informed and is deeply committed to serving her community with heart and integrity, considering it an honour to do so.

Kristy Alphonse-Palmantier, Williams Lake First Nation

Born and raised on her traditional territory in Williams Lake, Kristy has been a tireless advocate for First Nation voices in her community and beyond, including as an employee, advisor, entrepreneur and volunteer. Her career achievements include business ventures in retail and cattle, positions with the provincial government, two terms on Chief and Council and several roles with the Williams Lake Indian Band. Kristy completed a Certificate of Indigenous Studies and a Bachelor of General Studies through TRU. She now plans to merge and strengthen the tools she gained through her education with her traditional teachings.

Understanding trades training

Foundation programs provide hands-on practical knowledge and skills to prepare you for entry into the skilled-trades workforce. Program graduates receive credit that can be used toward the first year of in-school apprenticeship training, plus a substantial number of work-based hours toward their trade.

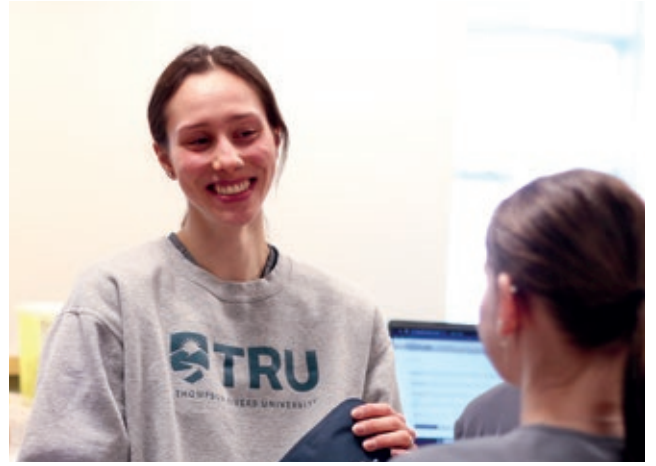
Apprenticeship programs provide in-school theory and practical training. An employer sponsors an employee to be registered with the Industry Training Authority of B.C. as an apprentice. Apprentices earn while they learn — the majority of apprenticeship training involves work-based, paid hours on the job. Many trades allow you to earn a Red Seal designation, a standard of excellence recognized across Canada and the world.

WHAT IF I DON'T MEET PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS?

If you don't meet the program-specific admission requirements but do meet the general admission requirement (or equivalent), you can be accepted to a non-competitive admission program. You will also be able to upgrade any required courses for that program, or a limited or competitive admission program.

DUAL CREDIT PROGRAMS

Youth Train in Trades

B.C. high school students have the opportunity to take a trades foundation program for both high school and university credit during their Grade 12 year.

TRU START

B.C. high school students have the opportunity to take one or two TRU courses during their Grade 12 year.

INTERNATIONAL AND PERMANENT RESIDENT STUDENTS

TRU is home to students from all over the world and we welcome applications from international students. If you are currently enrolled in a B.C. high school (or equivalent) you must meet the minimum requirements for direct entry into first-year academic programs:

- B.C. high school graduation (or equivalent)
- 73% in English 12

If you don't meet your program's English language requirement, or you did not graduate from a Canadian high school, you may meet and/or obtain the equivalency

through additional coursework or approved English placement assessment:

- Additional coursework: English as a Second Language (ESAL) course
- Assessment: TRU English placement test, TOEFL (iBT: 88+ with no sections below 2.0), IELTS General TRU Admission: (6.5+ with no bands below 6.0; for Practical Nursing diploma: Overall Band Score 7.0, Speaking 7.0, Listening 7.5, Reading 6.5, Writing 7.0) or Pearson Test of English

COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY TRANSFER

Academic transfer credit is assessed at the time of admission and upon receipt of official transcripts and any required supporting documentation. To qualify as a transfer student, you must be in good academic standing. Applicants from BC/Yukon refer to bctransferguide.ca for a listing of transferable courses. You may transfer up to a maximum

of 60 credits for campus-based programs. To qualify for the TRU transfer scholarships, you must have completed a minimum of 12 credits in the previous academic year.

Applying to TRU

- Apply online at tru.ca/apply
- Applications for Fall 2026 open on October 1, 2025. Make sure you apply early as some programs fill quickly.
- The application fee for Canadian citizen or permanent resident students is \$33.57; for international students it is \$100.00.

Please note: Applications for trades programs are accepted throughout the year.

Arrange for final transcripts

TRU requires receipt of official transcripts for all offers of admission. For many applicants, there are multiple methods of transcript submission.

Current B.C. high school students: You must give permission for your official interim and final grades to be automatically sent to TRU from the Ministry of Education. Sign up at the time of your first application at studenttranscripts.gov.bc.ca

All other applicants: Arrange to have your official final transcripts (high school and any post-secondary) sent directly from the issuing institution to TRU. In some circumstances, electronic submission may be available.

Many programs require receipt of official transcripts at the time of application and at the completion of any courses in progress. In this case, you will be required to submit your official transcripts more than once. Please refer to your communication from TRU Admissions regarding documentation.

Some programs will require additional admission documents such as (but not limited to) letters of intent, reference letters and pre-testing results.

The supporting document deadline, including high school and post-secondary transcripts, is the same date as the application deadline or within 10 days of submission of the application, whichever is later.

Application deadlines

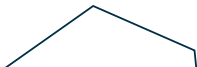
TRU Williams Lake begins accepting applications for all programs on Oct. 1. Applications for certain programs, including trades, are accepted throughout the year. Limited and non-competitive admission programs do not have a posted deadline but we encourage you to complete your application early to ensure seat availability.

Application deadlines that fall on a weekend or a statutory holiday will be extended to the next working day.

Programs may continue to accept applications as space permits.

Bachelor of Science in Nursing students at TRU Williams Lake will transition to TRU Kamloops upon successful completion of years one and two.

Your academic advisor will be able to assist with your program transfer or application when you are ready.
